

Pre-Islam— the Arabian Peninsula

- People:
 - Klan/tribe life was very important b/c of desert
- Mecca: (city)
 - Trade center
 - Kaaba—a building that contained statues of over 360 deities (idol worship)


- People traveled on pilgrimages to Mecca to visit the

Brought wealth








The Life of Muhammad—570-632

- Born in Mecca; married his boss at age 25
- 610 C.E.—The Night of Power—he experienced a revelation (vision)
 - His teachings: only one God that all must worship
- Most Meccans persecuted him for his teachings
 - Muhammad fled to Medina
- 621—Night Journey—taken to Jerusalem & then ascends to heaven to meet Allah

- Muslims eventually returned and defeated the Meccans and won support
 - Muslims entered Mecca—destroyed idols in Kaaba turned it into a sanctuary believed to be built by Abraham
- Muhammad was the last and greatest of the prophets

Connection Between Islam and Judaism




Beliefs of Islam:


- Qu'ran (Koran) = holy book
- Holy Cities:
 - Mecca = most holy city
 - Medina = 2nd most holy
 - Jerusalem = 3rd most holy
- Mosque = place of worship
 - No symbols of God or pictures of living things inside (to help focus on God)


The Interior of the Ka'bah




Dome of the Rock







Beliefs about Christianity

- Jesus was a prophet of God, not God incarnate
 - He was not crucified; God would not have one of His prophets killed
- Islam is a continuation of Judaism and Christianity (called them "people of the book")


Five Pillars of Islam


- 1. "There is no God but Allah, and Muhammad is his prophet"
- 2. Pray 5 times a day (facing Mecca)
- 3. Charity or alms
- 4. Fasting during month of Ramadan
- 5. Pilgrimage to Mecca (hajj)

Split in Isam

- <u>Caliph</u> = successor—after Muhammad died, a caliph was designated to spread Islam
- Division in Islam:
 - Shi'a (Shi'ite or Shi'i) = caliphs must be a relative of Muhammad (minority of Muslims today)
 - Sunni = didn't have to be a relative of Muhammad to be caliph (majority of Muslims today)
- (btw—the Islamic world today is not unified like it used to be—no caliphs—since 1258)
